Auditor's Report

I recently attended an auditor conference in Lewisburg in Union County. Being in office only two and a half years, it is beneficial for me to be with those who have served for years to learn from their experience and gather the knowledge they have to offer. The topics that were covered in the presentations from experts were auditing tax collectors, handling unclaimed property (checks usually on the county level), and submitting the required asset forfeiture reports and audits. I was also appointed as a legislative representative to the State Association of Elected **County Officials** (SAECO) group. The topics covered were issues not being addressed properly or at all when I took office. The tax collectors are to be audited on an annual basis. Every year, a report and audit are to be done of the asset forfeiture program. All property (checks) unclaimed after three years are to be reported and returned

to the state.

We (the auditors) began auditing the tax collectors last year. At this conference, we learned how to effectively do this. They are to submit taxes collected by the 10th of the month following collecting them. Not all do this. We learned that any amount of money left after submitting all taxes collected and unpaid to the county, need to be accounted for. We are working on defining those. Some tax collectors in our county have thousands of dollars in the account after all submissions have been made.

We reviewed the asset forfeiture regulations that require a report be made to the attorney general annually. This had not been done for years when we took office. It has been brought up to date and is current. Unclaimed property was something we all knew about when we see the big ads notifying us in the local papers. The requirement is that checks must be returned after being

In addition to serving as the chair of our county party, what other offices have you run for or held?

I have been an addicted volunteer for almost 50 years. One of my proudest moments came in 2007 when the National Wildlife Federation named me "Volunteer of the Year" for

Even though none of that is true, it's a tough nut to crack. Even more so with today's polarized electorate.

What are some goals you have for the party as we approach the next presidential election?

Democrats have to do a better job of getting our message out that "We Put People First," as our party's motto says. Our county is a perfect example. Many of our citizens have better healthcare coverage; hundreds of our children have been lifted out of poverty; soon, we will expand internet coverage in every corner of the county. Our roads and bridges are being rebuilt, and we have a new public safety building. All of these quality-of-life measures were made possible in large part by legislation and funding passed by Democrats. The electorate needs to know which party is actually working for them, and perhaps more importantly, which party is protecting our democracy. All this takes an active and motivated county committee.
